Standards vary across pet stores, welfare issues exist, and it is time to make improvements. There is data from PAW report for example which suggests improvements are required. From RWAF perspective, rabbits are commonly sold in pet shops and we see the effects of bad housing, poor diet advice, incorrect sexing and owners who took on a pet that is more complex than they realised. This should all be addressed at point of sale.

Were reluctant to comment on costs of the licence fee. A large fee favours a bigger pet retailer / chain. Whilst the smaller may not be better we would not want to push them towards on line sales, where they would not be inspected or regulated.

Given the evidence that this causes them further distress it would seem better to ban third party sales. However, other species should also be considered because the same concerns exist, and this would include rabbits. The only hesitation here is that it could again drive more sales on line which is less regulated and inspected and this needs to be considered with a plan of action for this also.

Owners and staff can change frequently and the quality of the advice given is dependant upon the member of staff at the time. Given the importance of the information passed to new owners being correct, and correct home checks being carried out, it is far too risky to allow inspections to go longer than 12 months apart. A decision made at point of sale will affect that animal for its entire life.

A specialist licence inspector would offer the same standards across all LA's and be familiar with all legislation and species because their scope would be narrower. As it is, LA's need to be able to inspect all sorts of different businesses and this means they can not specialise in all of the species involved in the pet shop inspections.

This also means owners can have been mislead and the welfare of the animal sold could be affected for the duration of its life We'd like to see licence conditions enforced (and based on MLC, not the conditions the LA's themselves chose as this can lead to a very diluted licence).
