Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to establish a Disability Commissioner for Scotland

The consultation runs from 12 May 2022 to 3 August 2022

Guide Dogs believes the proposed Bill would be a positive step towards tackling discrimination against people with sight loss and other disabilities. An independent Commissioner to promote and safeguard the rights of people with disabilities could help to create a more equal Scotland and tackle the barriers to education, employment, health, and wellbeing that many face. As well as helping to improve the lives of people with disabilities, this would make a positive contribution to performance on the Scottish Government's National Indicators and overall progress within the National Performance Framework.

We believe the consultation paper makes a clear case for creating a specific Disability Commissioner, capable of working alongside existing Commissioners. We consider this an excellent opportunity to improve the development, implementation and monitoring of policies and laws to tackle discrimination and reduce inequalities. People with sight loss face a wide range of challenges and barriers which limit their ability to participate in society in ways that others take for granted. This includes many basic aspects of everyday life, such as accessing public spaces and transport, or pursuing education and employment. We would welcome the opportunity to support the future work of a Disability Commissioner.

We believe legislation is required if the proposed Commissioner role is to have the authority and independence to carry out investigations and public bodies to account in a meaningful way.

The third sector is responsible for the delivery of many services for people with sight loss and other disabilities in Scotland. Guide Dogs and other charities have a direct channel of contact with service users and develop and promote best practice in response to their feedback. Many organisations in the sector are already very actively engaged with Scottish Government, Parliament, public sector providers and other statutory bodies. This includes having staff teams dedicated to research and external stakeholder engagement. We therefore believe that the proposal to promote best practice and learning will be essential to the success of a Disability Commissioner.

Lived experience and the meaningful involvement of people with disabilities should be at the heart of all legislative, policy and practice developments that affect them. As a minimum, this should involve common methods of gathering feedback and insight such as focus groups, surveys, and research interviews.

As noted in the consultation paper, people of working age with a disability are much less likely to be in employment compared to those without a disability. We would welcome positive action to encourage a diverse and representative staff team in the office of Disability Commissioner.

The role of the Disability Commissioner, including the power to carry out investigations, should be modelled on that of the Children & Young People's Commissioner. This will ensure all investigations are relevant to the Scottish Parliament's legislative competence and do not duplicate or impinge upon other bodies in Scotland with the power to carry out such investigations.
