Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to establish a Disability Commissioner for Scotland

The consultation runs from 12 May 2022 to 3 August 2022

Q1. Which of the following best expresses your view of the proposed Bill? (Please note that this question is compulsory.)

SPAEN has long believed that a Commissioner for disability and disabled people in Scotland is required. We hope that such a Commissioner will advance the rights of disabled people in Scotland and that disabled people will have a single point of contact through whom they can raise issues rather than the current disjoined systems in place which often result in matters relevant to disabled people are lost.

Q2. Which of the following best expresses your view on whether there is a need for a specific, dedicated commissioner focussing solely on people with a disability?

Disabled people in Scotland are under-represented and often forgotten. Having a Commissioner for disabled people will hopefully redress this and give a focus and voice through which disabled people can express themselves and be heard rather than ignored.

Q3. Do you think legislation is required, or are there other ways in which the proposed Bill's aims could be achieved more effectively? Please explain the reasons for your response.

We have had 12 years of a Self-directed Support Strategy; 17 years of a disability employment strategy and many more years of campaigning and fighting for equality in aspects such as housing; education and access to other parts of civil society, all of which have failed to make meaningful progress toward the rights of disabled people.

SPAEN considers that legislation is not only preferable but is absolutely essential if the Commissioner is to meaningfully represent and progress matters for disabled people in Scotland. A Commissioner without a legislative basis would be yet more 'tokenism'.

Scope of the Disability Commissioner Role

Having a Commissioner not only means that disabled people can be properly engaged and consulted, but the role must be key in the development and deployment of laws and policies affecting the Commissioner's constituents and we would therefore prefer that the Commissioner's role in such acts is enshrined in statute to avoid exclusion.

To gain the full benefit of having a Commissioner, the post-holder must ensure they engage with and learn from key stakeholders (disabled people) whilst also promoting and encouraging the widespread adoption of best practice. Indeed, SPAEN would like to see the Commissioner championing best practice across local and national government; the public, private and third sector on behalf of and in partnership with disabled people.

Please explain the reasons for your response. Please discuss how you think this would work in practise – would this be through focus groups, internships, paid roles etc

SPAEN would caveat our full support with some assurance and checks and balances that DPO's are fully and properly consulting and then representing the broad range of views and experiences of the people these organisations seek or claim to represent. To that end, we would suggest the Commissioner should encourage DPO's to engage in the work of the Commissioner but not to the exclusion of all relevant stakeholders, and most importantly, at an individual level, disabled people. There must be a hybrid approach that ensures the broadest engagement and influence on the work of the Commissioner.

Q8. Who should the Disability Commissioner be allowed to investigate?

Both Scottish Public Bodies and service providers

Please explain the reasons for your response

SPAEN would suggest this should extend to beyond just public bodies and service providers and include DPO's and any other bodies representing or working with disabled people who might argue they are outside the scope of a "service provider" where they do not necessarily provide "services" in the legal definition of the term.
