Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to establish a Disability Commissioner for Scotland

The consultation runs from 12 May 2022 to 3 August 2022

I see the need for a champion of disabled people's rights. Someone with lived experience and the drive, enthusiasm and strong leadership skills to drive the agenda. My slight concern would be how we foster good working between a Disability Commissioner and existing organisations such as EHRC and SHRC. I do not think the EHRC or SHRC have done enough to advance the rights of disabled people and believe a the right Commissioner could work with them focusing on disability as a protected characteristic as I believe this focus has been lost since the introduction of the Equality Act 2010 and the need to advance equality for all groups sharing protected characteristics.
