

# Proposed Disability Commissioner (Scotland) Bill

## Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to establish a Disability Commissioner for Scotland

The consultation runs from 12 May 2022 to 3 August 2022

We need a voice at the Scottish Parliament who can advocate and argue for the needs of disabled people in key areas, for example: we need better enforcement of legislation when it comes to disabled parking and parking on the pavement. Planning legislation is weak in terms of building accessibility and accessible toilets, when it comes to the Public Sector Equality Duty, most organisations do not comply with it. There is also a lack of 'case law' relating to features which should be fined in buildings and streetscapes for actually putting people with disabilities at a disadvantage.

Q3. Do you think legislation is required, or are there other ways in which the proposed Bill's aims could be achieved more effectively? Please explain the reasons for your response.

Existing disability legislation is very good, but the problem is it isn't enforced by councils or public bodies. There is significant ignorance with our local council over the Equality Act, particularly with Planning. Unfortunately the legacy relating to approving buildings will mean that errors don't get corrected.

Totally agree, particularly if these organisations have research material or technical/medical knowledge (sapiential) who can guide people with lived experience of their disabilities to outcomes which favour and satisfy the needs of people with disabilities.

The architect is in the position of having a very significant effect on buildings and streetscapes through inclusive design, yet less than 20% take this module. We need 100% of architects to understand the built environment for people with disabilities to ensure that the best possible outcomes are achieved in the functionality of their design. Unfortunately many buildings and streets have more to do with the cosmetic looks than how they harmonise with the broader needs of society.
